Teaching Approaches

Book Talk

Discussion about books forms the foundations for working with books. Children need frequent, regular and sustained opportunities to talk together about the books that they are reading as a whole class. The more experience they have of talking together like this the better they get at making explicit the meaning that a text holds for them

Engaging in Art/Craft and Illustration

Power of Pictures research has proven that opportunities to draw, both before and during writing, increase children's motivation to write, and can help them to think. Drawing can help all writers to plan their writing, develop their ideas and use vivid description.

Drawing story settings or key events prompts children to imagine what a scene looks like, or visualise it from a particular viewpoint. Like drama, it enables children to enter the world of the story and provides support for writing.


Role on the Wall

Role on the wall is a fantastic approach for promoting inference and deduction, and getting to know and understand characters in more detail, understanding their motivations and therefore their actions at various stopping points across a text. It improves and explores a rich vocabulary.


















Shared Writing

Shared writing is one of the most important ways a teacher can show children how writing works and what it's like to be a writer.


Acting as scribe, the teacher works with a small or large group of children to create a text together, enabling them to concentrate on their ideas and composition. Teacher and children work as active partners, talking together to share ideas and while the teacher guides the children through all the decisions that writers need to make and helps them shape their thoughts on paper.

Shared writing gives children a model for their own independent writing and can introduce them to unfamiliar genre or style of writing. Children can then present their written work in a range of literary outcomes such as a poster, big book or poem for everyone to enjoy.

<u>Writing in Role</u>

Taking the role of a particular character enables young writers to see events from a different view point and involves them writing in a different voice.




Story Mapping/ Story Boarding

Making a story map is a way of retelling the story. It is a graphic means of breaking a story down into episodes and sequencing its events. This kind of graphic representation helps children to hold on to the shape of the story more confidently so they can re-tell it orally or in writing.

Drama and Role Play


Through drama and role-play children can imagine characters' body language, behaviour and tones of voice in ways that they can draw on later when they write.



Book Making

Publishing their work for an audience helps children to write more purposefully. Bookmaking provides a motivating context within which children can bring together their developing understanding of what written language is like; making written language meaningful as they construct their own texts.



Conscience Alley

Conscience Alley to prepare children for debate or persuasive writing. Conscience Alley is useful technique for exploring any kind of dilemma faced by a character, providing an opportunity to analyse a decisive moment in greater detail.

Debate and Argument

Teachers can structure debates inviting 'for' and 'against' arguments around particular statements arising from a book. Improving oracy skills and confidence.

Hot Seating

This activity involves children closely examining a character's motivation and responses.



Freeze Frame and Thought Tracking

Freeze-frames are still images or tableaux. They can be used to enable groups of children to examine a key event or situation from a story and decide in detail how it could be represented.

Reader's Theatre

Reader's theatre is a valuable way for children to work in a group to perform the text. It allows the children to really become involved in the literature, which is what reader's theatre is all about. The children will, unconsciously perhaps, be involved in analysing the structure, characterization, and description used in the literature. They will be stimulated to creatively adapt their piece and will really "own" their presentation.

Working with Authors/Illustrators

Having the opportunity to see and learn from a professional writer's practice can be aspirational for children as writers and help them to see the process of writing from a new and exciting perspective.




Writing Poetry

Personal experiences and memories can provide a powerful stimulus for children's poetry writing. Episodes from family life and childhood are often particularly rich and vivid sources of experiences which can be recalled and explored. Through poetry writing, children are encouraged to reflect on their experience, to recreate it, shape it, and make sense of it.

Ks1 braved the weather on a cold November morning in order to use our senses around the fire pit. It definitely warmed us up. We collected 'wonderful words' ready to write poems about Fire. We are looking forward to Bonfire Night.





Performance Poetry

The experience of performing poetry enables children to respond to the rhythms, patterns and word play in poems. Giving voice and sound to poetry is an important key to unlocking the meanings and music contained in each poem.


